

CONGRESSMAN PLANNING NEW PEACE-TIME GAG LAW

SPEECH FREE ONLY TO SUPPORTERS OF CAPITALISM

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The special session of Congress has convened and the usual lot of bills of all varieties and shades of color have been dumped into the legislative hopper. The machinery having started, the folks back home will soon be regaled with the flowery eloquence of their chosen representatives as they endeavor to convince the empty benches of the chamber of their loyalty to the welfare of the dear "peeps." In the meantime the forces of autocracy and privilege will be busy saying little for publication in the Record but doing much that would make more interesting reading than Senator Blank's ideas about the flag and our "solemn duty" to defend it from insult.

One of the first attacks on the rights of the people will be a new anti-Bolshevik Espionage Law under the tutelage of Major Humes of the infamous Eversman Committee. This bill has the present Espionage law backed off the boards for Castric diabolism. All persons suspected of harboring revolutionary sentiment will be in danger of its penalties and intelligent looking people might move about freely on the streets at their peril. The sponsors of this sinister move seem to rely upon the anti-Bolshevik, anti-labor propaganda of the past few months as a sort of poison gas screen to enable them to get in their work before labor wakes up. Another Furuseth of the International Seaman's Union, just returned from Paris was in Washington recently and he expressed himself as being greatly alarmed at the danger that free speech and free press would be permanently strangled in America. His word was for labor to lose no time in denouncing the plan of its legislation.

Senator Francis Marshall has introduced a bill for the suppression of the press of Russia and other foreign countries in the spirit of the present Espionage law. It is a measure designed to prevent the press of these countries from operating in their own right and to prevent them from using the press to disseminate information which would be injurious to the interests of the United States. It provides that any information which is conveyed to the United States by the press of these countries shall be considered as confidential information and shall be treated as such. It also provides that any person who disseminates such information shall be liable to the same penalties as provided in the Espionage law. K. C. JEWS PREPARE HUGE PROTEST AGAINST POLO MASSACRES

POGROMS INSTIGATED BY REACTIONARY PADREWSKY MINISTRY

Next Sunday afternoon at 5 P. M., the Jewish population of Kansas City will take together in a huge protest parade against the pogroms in Poland. There are approximately 25,000 Jews in Kansas City, Missouri, and it is believed that a large proportion will parade. The parade will be formed at the Jewish Institute, 1009 Admiral Boscawen and will traverse the downtown business district ending at the Agitation Theatre, 319 and Helmsman. A mass meeting will be held there at 7 P. M. at which Judah Labaree, Mr. Bleyer of the Y. M. C. A. and many other well known citizens will speak in English and justly deservedly in Polish. This is one of a series of big protests (parades and mass meetings) being held all over the country. New York recently held one-half million Jews united in demonstration. A mass meeting was held in Madison Square Garden with fifteen thousand leaders.

HOLDS HEARING ON DEPORTATION OF SOCIALIST

POSSESSION OF LITERATURE ONLY EVIDENCE

Joseph Winchuck, a young Russian Socialist who has been held for over two weeks on complaint of department clerks at the Morris Packing Co., charged with being a socialist and held for deportation, was given a hearing before Immigration Inspector, Warren E. Long, at the Federal Building, Kansas City, Kansas, Friday, May 23rd.

The testimony entirely failed upon the only point in the warrant of arrest and information upon which deportation could be based—the advocacy of violence. Winchuck was shown to be a law-abiding, respectable man, a member of the AMALGAMATED MEAT CUTTERS & BUTCHER WORKMENS UNION, a member of the Greek Catholic Church, with a record for being "a nice boy; no trouble to get along with," and a member of the Socialist Party.

The case has the appearance of notes on the testimony at the hearing being an attempt on the part of the Immigration Department to deprive labor and socialist activists of their jobs. Winchuck was represented at the hearing by Harry Sullivan, an attorney of Kansas City, Kansas, and in another place will be found hereafter by E. H. Reeves, Editor of the Workers Defense Union, of New York City.

"Make A. F. of L. The Workers' Government," Say Cigarmakers

Referendum Proposed by Boston Local.

BOSTON, May 26.—A move was being started by Cigarmakers Union of this city for the organization of a Labor Party, the object of which is to be the conscription of industry and land, and their management by the labor unions under the government.

The resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS the National Hughes Alliance issued a declaration of independence on April 15th, 1919, and H. Hughes to the Presidency, which is the only one of the four candidates of the party who has any chance of being elected.

RESOLVED, That we, the members of Cigarmakers' International Union of America, No. 97, in meeting assembled do hereby declare a referendum vote to be taken by the membership of the C. M. I. of A., and in order of adoption, that our delegates to the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, and the members of the various branches and work for the organization of a political party under the following fundamental principles:

First. To make the Trade Union the State of the Nation as a whole.

Second. That all the land and workshops and public utilities be controlled by the workers.

Third. That the hours of work be reduced to eight hours a day, and the day of rest be guaranteed to the workers.

Fourth. That each respective branch of the workers have a party which shall constitute an average political party.

Fifth. That each worker vote for a candidate of his own party.

SIXTH. That the workers of all trades and professions be united in one party.

SEVENTH. That the workers of all trades and professions be united in one party.
